	A noun or object pronoun that receives the action of the verb (not all action verbs take direct objects. Those that do are considered transitive (the verb transfers action to the direct object. Answers who? or what? of verb). Action verbs that do not take a direct object are called intransitive.			
	Ex)			
	He dropped the watermelon. (dropped what?)			
	Alexander defeated Darius. (defeated whom?)			
	Jacob tightened his fist. (tightened what?)			
	Edward warned Jacob to stay away. (warned whom?)
